
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

#### INTRODUCTION


After Jesus was crucified and resurrected from the dead, He gave His followers, or disciples, a clear command called the **Great Commission**: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:19-20). Becoming a disciple is at the heart of Jesus' message and mission. The Apostle Paul followed this command and was called to go and make disciples in the Gentile world. Let us observe how he practiced the Great Commission. Paul was going, being sent out by the Holy Spirit and the Antioch Church (Acts 13:1-3). Paul made disciples by preaching the gospel (Acts 14:6-7) and the disciples were baptized (Acts 16:31-34). Paul was teaching and establishing believers by returning to the churches where he had previously preached the gospel in order to strengthen the souls of the disciples there (Acts 14:21-22), who responded to the gospel by following Christ.

In <u>God's Plan for His Disciples</u>, we have attempted to follow a biblical model and a pattern found in the Early Church and recorded in the Book of Acts that resulted in the greatest expansion and explosion of the church ever recorded. This expansion went from Jerusalem to Rome in just 25 years enabling the Apostle Paul to complete his three missionary journeys in just ten years. We might also note that these early disciples literally turned their world upside down (Acts 17:6) and many of them gave their lives for the sake of the gospel.

This training course, <u>God's Plan for His Disciples</u>, is designed for you to be able to search the Scriptures for yourself and learn what it means to be a true disciple of Jesus Christ. As you become a mature follower of Christ, some of you might want to continue to follow Christ into leadership. 
# Help for Training Oral and Visual Learners

There are an estimated 5.7 billion people in the world who are oral and visual learners or below basic literacy skills. Most oral and visual learners belong to cultures that do not teach with books but with conversations, narratives, music, and visual arts. Therefore, oral learners may struggle to understand the written word and most prefer to learn by listening and seeing. On a more positive note, most oral and visual learners will remember up to 75% of what they hear, say and see. Most of the unreached people groups in the world today are oral and visual learners.

Therefore, don't rely too heavily on reading for information only without including discussion, questions, and visuals. Allow plenty of time for discussions, both one-on-one and in groups. Oral learners make connections when they can talk through concepts with others. Do not rely wholly on visuals to explain a concept or assume that visuals alone are helpful to them. They will most likely need extra help in understanding visuals. Here is a basic format you can use in helping to establish oral learners in understanding Scripture. This format is from the story of Philip and the Ethiopian Eunuch in Acts 8:26-38. You can tell this story with the oral learner after you have prayed and asked the Holy Spirit to teach you. Then follow the steps on the next page. (NOTE: See page v and the inside front cover for diagrams to help with oral and visual learners).

- 1. Read the Word of God together and have them recite or say out loud their <u>observations</u>. Use the visuals to support what you have read and what they have observed. (See Acts 8:28).
- 2. Ask the oral learner to <u>meditate</u> or <u>think</u> about and to explain what they have observed from the Word of God and the visuals. (See Acts 8:30).
- 3. <u>Discuss</u> together by asking and answering questions about what God is saying and what the visuals mean. What are the key principles and how are they relevant today to you? (See Acts 8:31-35).
- 4. Now what? How and when will you make <u>application</u> to your life? (See Acts 8:36-38).



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
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# God's Plan for His Disciples - Part One

The purpose of this course is to set forth supra-cultural and timeless principles (Biblical principles which transcend culture and time) used by the Early Church, that produced such powerful disciples who turned their world upside down for Christ (Acts 17:6). Looking at the map below, how many years did it take the gospel to spread from Jerusalem to Rome? \_\_\_\_\_ Yes, only 25 years. Let me ask you; do you know of any church in the world that is making that kind of progress and impact today? Keep in mind that they had none of the modern-day travel, technology and training institutions we have today. It would be difficult to find a better model than the Early Church in the work of establishing and growing disciples.



The intent of this manual is to bridge these principles into today's disciples so that we may see amazing results in our world. We see one of these key principles in Acts 14:21-22 and many other references to "establishing" or "strengthening" new disciples. The literal meaning of this word "establish" or "strengthen" is to "fix" or "fasten" them in their faith



as to a stake. Our objective is to come alongside (stake up) new disciples so they can stand on their own (See diagram at left).


How can you stand strong on your own and help other disciples do the same? First, you must recognize the Bible as the source of these key principles that will establish and strengthen a disciple. You want to lay a solid

foundation in the authority and sufficiency of Scripture (Acts 18:24-28) Lesson 1, and in the Holy Spirit (Acts 19:1-7) Lesson 2. Having a strong foundation in the Word and the Spirit will enable disciples to grow and become fruitful.

# Lesson 5a Prayer (Acts 2:42)



As with the Lord's Supper and with so many other traditions, routine can often aspirate the life and heart out of prayer. Our relationship with God is at the heart of prayer; prayer consists merely of speaking to God our Father and subjecting our will to His will. Prayer is the means for the followers of Jesus Christ to communicate to God their requests, worship, praise, emotions, and desires. It may be audible or silent, private or public, official or casual. I like this definition of prayer by J. C. Lambert, "Christian prayer in its full New Testament meaning is prayer addressed to God as Father, in the name of Christ as Mediator, and through the enabling grace of the indwelling Spirit". Since we are following this powerful and effective pattern of the Early Church in Lessons 1-5, let us discover how Luke records the acts of prayer in the book of Acts in Lesson 5a. You will clearly see the connection between prayer and the power of the Holy Spirit. # III. Disciples' Established in Bible Study

#### Lesson 6

# Instructions on How to Study the Bible (Acts 8:26-38)

(See page iv; Help for Training Oral Learners)

Before you get started in learning how to study the Bible, read the story of Philip and the Ethiopian Eunuch in Acts 8:26-38 and see if you can pick out the four key principles of Bible Study in this story: <u>OBSERVATION</u> (Verse 28), <u>MEDITATION</u> (Verse 30), <u>DISCUSSION</u> (Verses 31-35) and <u>APPLICATION</u> (Verses 36-38).

## 1 - OBSERVATION - "LOOK AT IT" - What does it say?

- Information Discover what the Bible says.
- Pray the Holy Spirit will help you see it.

<u>Observation</u> is the basic key to understanding God's Word; it is focusing your heart, mind and undivided attention on a passage of Scripture and the context around that Scripture in order to discover what God is saying. It may be helpful to read the passage several times and ask yourself what is happening, who is involved, where is this taking place and when is it taking place. After you read the passage and context, summarize your observations.

As an example, let's discover what the Bible says in Matthew 6:33. In order to understand the context for verse 33, you should first read verse 24-34. After reading the context, write down some of your observations of what Jesus is saying in verse 33. The following is an example to get you started. You will probably want to add many more observations.

You cannot serve both God and money. Do not be anxious about what you will eat or drink or wear. God feeds the birds and clothes the flowers and knows what we need. Seek Him first and all your needs or things will be added to you. Therefore, do not be anxious about tomorrow or things.

## 2 - MEDITATION - "THINK ABOUT IT" - What does it mean?

- Illumination Discover what the Bible means.
- Pray the Holy Spirit will help you understand it.

<u>Meditating</u> or thinking about your observations helps you to understand or interpret the meaning of a passage in the Bible. One way to understand its meaning is to think about what the author intends the readers to know from what he has written or said. Remember that context can help answer many of your questions concerning a particular passage. Another valuable resource to help you understand is other passages in the Bible. Now look at the observations above in step 1 and ask yourself, "What does Jesus want us to know about verse 6:33?" What does this verse mean? Summarize your thoughts and key principles on the next page:

You cannot serve both God and things like money, food or clothes. It is either one or the other. When you attempt to serve two masters, you will be anxious because your mind and heart will be divided. You must seek and serve only one Master who is God. Put Him first and only Him. You can trust God with confidence because He knows what you need, and certainly if He can feed the birds and clothe the flowers, He will take care of your needs.

## 3 - DISCUSSION - "TALK ABOUT IT" - What do others say?

<u>Note:</u> This step will most likely blend in with the <u>Meditation</u> Step 2. You will not use this discussion step if you are doing your own personal quiet time study. See page 55.

- Conversation Discover what others are saying.
- Pray the Holy Spirit will help you learn from others.

<u>Discussion</u> among individuals is the oldest and still one of the most effective teaching tactics used to draw out ideas and challenge presumptions by asking and answering questions. Discussion was used by the Early Church (Acts 17:2; 17:17; 18:4; 18:19; 19:8-9; 24:25) to challenge and encourage each other's life and ministry. Discuss with others your thoughts and the key principles that you discovered in your meditation, step 2.

<u>Discussion:</u> Contrast the principles you learned from Matthew 6:33 with your life experience today. <u>Today we attempt to serve and invest our lives and resources into the world and the Lord. Our culture and traditions say we can have both money, pleasure and self-fulfillment, and the Lord.</u>

What changes do you need to make in your life? Stop trying to serve two masters and seek to serve Christ only. I no longer need to be anxious about things since God knows all my needs and will supply them, if I seek Him first.

# 4 - APPLICATION - "DO IT" - How can I apply it to my life?

- Transformation Discover how the Bible works.
- Pray the Holy Spirit will help you do it.

<u>Application</u> should be the result of studying the Bible. We want our lives transformed into the image of Jesus Christ and to grow deeper in our relationship with God. The application step is not completed by simply answering these questions but by putting into practice what the Holy Spirit has revealed to you. As you listen to God and obey His Word, you will be amazed at the results and the joy in your life as your relationship with Him deepens in Christ.

<u>Application:</u> How and when will you make changes in your life?

I will invest my time and resources in the Lord's kingdom and serving Him first, not for my personal pleasure and benefit. I will start today to make choices to serve and obey one Master, my Savior, the Living Word and stop trying to serve Christ and the world, myself, money, things and pleasure.



# God's Plan for His Disciples - Part Two

The Apostle Paul's "ambition [was] to preach the gospel, not where Christ has already been named, lest [he] builds on someone else's foundation...[so] those who have never been told of [Christ] will see and those who have never heard will understand" (Romans 15:20-21). After Paul had preached the gospel which made disciples, we read in Acts 14:21-22 that Paul returned to *establish* or *strengthen* those new disciples or learners "to continue in the faith."

Paul was not just concerned with making disciples, but he wanted the disciples to be established or strengthened. The word "strengthen" or "establish" is translated from the original Greek word "stërizõ" which means to "make stronger, fix or to fasten in place." Its usage gives us a key insight into what Paul wanted new disciples to become. He wanted




them to be
"fixed" or
"fastened" in
their faith.
Literally, this
word means to
"support or to fix
something so that
it stands upright
by itself or
becomes
immovable until
it stands on its
own."

For example, the original word

literally was used to describe a stake that supports a vine (See above diagram). Therefore, Paul wanted new and older disciples to be stable and self-sustaining, not easily moved or shaken by false doctrine or teaching.

In order to strengthen the new disciples, Paul not only visited these churches, but he wrote letters explaining how to establish new and existing disciples. As we read in Lesson One and Two, God has graciously and sufficiently provided all that we need through His Word to completely establish any disciple. Do you know how many letters Paul wrote in the New Testament? Yes, 13 letters. Can you name the 13 letters in the order they are placed in the Bible? To help you better understand Paul's establishing process, let us put his thirteen letters into chronological order as they were written, not the order in the Bible, which is from the longest letter (Romans) to the shortest letter (Philemon).

His letters will then look like this in their chronological order they were written.



You are thinking, why do this? By dividing his letters chronologically, they practically and systematically divide into three simple theological categories as follows:

#### Paul's Early Letters (Used to establish and defend the Gospel of Grace)

Galatians: Returning to the Spirit, faith and the pure gospel

1 and 2 Thessalonians: Standing firm in the gospel

**1 Corinthians:** Divisions solved by the implications of the gospel

**2 Corinthians:** Defense of the ministry and minister of the gospel

Romans: Preaching a complete discourse and work of the gospel

#### Paul's Middle Letters (Used for churches to be single-minded in the Plan of God)

**Ephesians:** Grasping the mystery of the church and revealing the plan of Christ

Philippians: Being of one mind in the church and in the progress of the gospel

Colossians: Keeping the focus on the Head of the Church

Philemon: Relational implications of being one-minded in the progress of the gospel


### Paul's Latter Letters (Used to put in proper order the Household of God)

1 Timothy: Properly ordering the community life of the Household of God, His Church

**Titus:** Setting in order what remains by fully establishing the churches in sound doctrine

**2 Timothy:** Passing the baton on to well-trained, faithful leaders for the next generation

Paul was "like a skilled master builder" (1 Corinthians 3:10). You might describe his letters as building blocks which were laid chronologically for the foundation of God's family and household. For example, you can see below, Paul's first letters or the Early Letters were written to establish new disciples in the Gospel of Pure Grace which is Jesus Christ. Maybe this diagram will help explain the chronological and theological order of Paul's letters:



Since Paul was a skilled master church planter, let us consider his letters like "tools of the trade," so to speak. Just as a master carpenter or mechanic must know what tools to use on a particular job, so a disciple must learn what tools to use to make a disciple strong and established in the Word of God. See the tools below and identify how each one is used:



While this seems so simple, it is amazing the lack of understanding and ability to use God's Word as tools. Just like carpenters and mechanics know the tools of their trade, so should every disciple learn and know how to use God's Word. God has graciously given us every tool we need to deal with any problem we might face in following Christ (2 Timothy 3:16-17).

Now we will take one letter or tool from each of these three categories to help establish and make you a strong disciple. For example, in Lesson 8 we will use Galatians from the Early Letters to establish you in the "Gospel of Pure Grace." Next in Lesson 9, we will use Ephesians from the Middle Letters to establish you to be "Single-minded in the Purpose and Eternal Plan of God." Finally, in Lesson 10, we will use 1 Timothy from the Latter Letters to establish you in the "Properly Ordered Household of God." We will start with one of the most important foundational doctrines of the Christian Faith, the "Gospel of Pure Grace."

# IV. Disciples Established in the Gospel of Pure Grace Lesson 8

# Gospel of Pure Grace Early Letters

48-57 AD

<u>Galatians</u> is one of Paul's first letters written to establish believers in the Gospel of Pure Grace. This letter teaches that a disciple is set free and justified by grace alone through faith, not by works or by keeping the law. This letter also exposes the flesh as a popular substitute for the Holy Spirit among many disciples. **NOTE:** The study of Galatians is also found in our training manual, *God's Plan for His Church*, Lesson 13, page 98.







# Lesson 13 Daily Quiet Time with the Lord



This is one of the most important aspects of your life with Christ. Several years ago, I was with Henry Blackaby who wrote "Experiencing God" and I asked him how his relationship witl Christ remained so fresh and consistent. He told me that many years ago when he was 17 years old, he decided that if he was going to walk with Christ, it meant that he would have to make time to spend time daily in the morning with the Word of God. Having a daily quiet time with the Lord is not just a commendable practice, it is vital to experiencing an abundant, full, and joyful life in Christ. Observe Jeremiah 15:16; what did he do when he found the words of God? What did they become to him? "A and the to his heart." Like eating food, we taste it (Observation), chew it (Meditation) and swallow it (Application). Jeremiah read the Word, meditated on the Word and obeyed the Word. Now let us briefly define from the Word what it means to spend time in His Word
and prayer; we will call this time of communion a "quiet time".

# Lesson 14 Practical Helps for Prayer and Worship

To help you get started with your quiet time and to walk and live in Christ consistently, I want to suggest journaling or taking a daily journey with Christ in His Word. It is essential that you not only develop your time in His Word, but develop your prayer life both in your quiet time and in your life. Prayer is very important in the Bible. It records about 650 prayers and 450 answers to those prayers. The New Testament records Jesus praying 25 times and Paul mentioning prayer 41 times. Many of these prayers are recorded or referenced in *God's Plan for His Disciples*: Page 11, 2., Page 17, 12., Pages 20-22, Pages 33-34, 1-10., Page 36, 31., Page 38, 1-3., Pages 45-47, Pages 48-49, Pages 55-56. Here are some practical ways that can help you get started praying at all times in the Spirit. Here is an acrostic of **ACTS** that will guide you in four biblical aspects of prayer and worship.

- A ADORATION (Revelation 5:12-13) To reflect on the power, majesty and glory of God.
- C CONFESSION (1 John 1:8-10) To agree with God to have our sins forgiven and cleansed.
- T THANKSGIVING (Psalm 95:2-3) To accept the will of God in all things concerning you.
- S SUPPLICATION (Philippians 4:6) To making our requests and petitions known to God.

Here is a Supplication or Request list which will help you be more effective in your prayer life. I suggest the following daily prayer guide or you can develop your own.

1.	Personal

If you are a new disciple or if you have never had a consistent and meaningful daily meeting with God, let me help you get started with this 5 minute a day, 30-day Bible reading schedule. This daily reading schedule will help you discover and grasp who God is from His *Names* and *Attributes* and what He can mean to you. It will help you get started on your lifelong daily journey with your Heavenly Father and your personal Savior. After this 30-day plan, there is A 31-Day Encounter with Jesus on page 56 which will enhance your relationship with the Lord. Also, we have provided several complete Bible reading plans on pages 57-59 where you can develop your own methodology or schedule. Remember, we are all different and unique, so please choose what suits you and foremost, do not bite off more than you can chew and digest.

<u>Day 1</u> - "JEHOVAH" Read and Observe Exodus 3:13-15 and John 8:58-59
The name of the independent, self-complete being, I AM WHO I AM, Jehovah God!

Jehovah heals. God alone provides the remedy for humanity's brokenness.
<u>Application</u> : What effect or change does this Name have on your personal life?

All things are God's to give, and He provides all that you need; He needs absolutely nothing.

God is our Banner who leads us triumphantly and gives us the victory in Christ Jesus.

God always acts through His infinite wisdom and accomplishes all things for our good and His glory.

Jesus taught us to pray, "Our Father." The Spirit taught us to cry "Abba (Intimate Father).

Christ is the head of the Church who sees, hears, thinks and decides all things.
Therefore, who should the church be looking to for leadership and direction?
<u>Day 28</u> - "OUR INTERCESSOR" Read and Observe Hebrews 4:14-16 and 1 Timothy 2:5
God the Son intercedes for us. He opens the door for us to ask God the Father.
<u>Application</u> : What effect or change does this attribute have on your personal life?

<u>Day 29</u> - "ADONAI" Read and Observe 2 Samuel 7:18-22 and Philippians 2:7-11
God is Master or Lord over His people and His servants.
<u>Application</u> : What effect or change does this Name have on your personal life?
<u>Day 30</u> - "ELOHIM" Read and Observe Genesis 17:7-8 and Revelation 1:8
God is mighty and strong, displaying His supreme sovereignty.
<u>Application</u> : What effect or change does this Name have on your personal life?
Additional Helps in Your Day-by-Day Journey with the Lord
First, go back and review Lessons 6 and 7 (Pages 20-22), "Instructions on How to Study the Bible." To help enhance your daily quiet time (Lesson 13, page 48), get a lined notebook and label the pages into 3 steps to record your journey with the Bread of Life. See the example below. Remember, this does not include the discussion step in Lesson 6 and 7 since this is your personal quiet time in the Word. Discussion can be done later by sharing your quiet time insights with others. To help you get started, take Psalm 23:1, like you did with Matthew 6:33 in Lesson 6 (pages 20-21) and Mark 1:35 in Lesson 7 (page 22). Here you might want to also read Psalm 23:1-9 for the context in step 1 - Observation and step 2 - Meditation. Then complete step 3 - Application. You will obviously need more lines in your notebook than we have below. Remember to pray. Someone told me years ago that the Lord's phone number is Jeremiah 33:3.
1 - OBSERVATION - "LOOK AT IT" - What does it say? (Information)
(This is just a guide, so use a notebook with more spaces).
2 - MEDITATION - "THINK ABOUT IT" - What does it mean? (Illumination)
(This is just a guide, so use a notebook with more spaces).
3 - <u>APPLICATION</u> - "LIVE IT - DO IT" - Now what? (Transformation)
(This is just a guide, so use a notebook with more spaces).
To help you get started on your journey with the Living Word, I would suggest the "31-day

Encounter with Jesus" on the next page. You can take each theme and Scripture and use the above 3-step method. After the "31-day Encounter with Jesus", you can start reading the whole Bible (see pages 57-59) or certain Bible books or letters as the Spirit leads you.

Now that you have a good solid foundation in the Word of God, the role of the Holy Spirit, the Gospel of Pure Grace, God's Purpose and Eternal Plan and God's Order in His Household or Family. I would suggest reading through the whole Bible. There is a Bible reading schedule on the next three pages that breaks down reading the whole Bible into 365 days; if that is too much reading for you to understand or comprehend, you can adjust the schedule to what is best for you. I have found that I can read through the New Testament in one year and the Old Testament the next year. You can take the following Bible reading schedule and make it into a one, two, three, four or five-year plan. A word of caution: do not read just for information. Have a scheduled Quiet Time that will deepen your relationship with God and transform your life. A Bible reading schedule is provided on pages 57-59.

Remember, as you read through the Word of God, that it is Truth. Truth is a Person, Jesus Christ, the Living Word of God and all Scripture points to Christ. Note that this is your personal quiet time, so you will not be discussing it with others at that particular moment. You might later want to discuss with others what you have learned by chewing on the meat of the Word.



- •<u>Teaches</u> a model of leadership and church planting and renewal; a model that is "unstoppable" and can actually thrive in poverty and persecution.


